1.Call to Order	Meeting was convened at 10:04 AM.

2.Roll Call Establish Quorum Approve Minutes Zack Goss, Director of Customer Communication	Motion: Approve the May 20, 2024 meeting minutes as presented. <ul> <li>3.Health Benefits Eligibility and Enrollment (HBEE) Rules Revisions</li> <li>Dani Fuoco, Senior Policy and Implementation Analyst (DVHA)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Dani explained that the HBEE provides eligibility standards for Medicaid and other health care programs. This year rulemaking will affect Parts 2, 3, and 7 of this 8 part rule.</li> <li>She noted that some rule changes are federally required and others are making permanent policies that had been enacted during the unwinding of the continuous coverage requirements in place during the COVID-19 public health emergency (PHE).</li> <li>She reviewed the revisions by HBEE part including if the change was in effect now and if it was unwinding related.</li> <li>Discussion on what the automatic QMB enrollment for SSI recipients looks like. Dani explained that SSI recipients are eligible for QMB and this guarantees that they receive it.</li> <li>Addie said that the removal of the interview requirement for Long Term Care (LTC) Medicaid is a big change and is expected to have a significant impact. It was removed at the beginning of this month ahead of the HBEE rulemaking.</li> <li>Dani shared the tentative timeline for this process beginning with filing the rule by August 30, 2024 and projecting an effective date of January 1, 2025.</li> </ul>

Zack Goss, Director of	<ul> <li>In 2017, the federal administration stopped paying for federal cost-</li> </ul>	
Customer Communication	sharing subsidies without removing the requirement to pay for them. Cost share reduction (CSR) automatically show up in the plans that come up for eligible members.	
	<ul> <li>As an alternative method to pay for the benefit, states started pricing silver plans higher which results in additional premium subsidies. This is called silver loading.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Addie noted that reflective silver plans available for direct enrollment with insurers don't have the extra cost.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The Green Mountain Care Board has implemented enhanced silver loading for 2025. Because of this change, silver premiums will be higher than gold plan premiums this open enrollment. This increases access to subsidies and many Vermonters will be able to enroll in better plans than they have now for a lower cost.</li> <li>The goal is to support those silver plan members who would be paying more in 2025 for a less generous plan by mapping them to gold plans. The default for the system previously would be to enroll the member in the same plan in which they are currently enrolled;</li> </ul>	
	however, the system will be updated to offer the more generous gold	
	plan if it is a lower premium than their current silver plan.	
	<ul> <li>This requires a change in messaging as DVHA will encourage members to shop the plans and make the increased subsidies work best for their families.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>It was noted that, based on current enrollment totals, just under 6,000</li> </ul>	
	silver enrollees will be mapped to gold plans.	
	<ul> <li>Cory stated that it's important to consider how this will make care</li> </ul>	
	more affordable in out-of-pocket costs for the members.	
	<ul> <li>Idea for DVHA to create a fact sheet for providers that presents the</li> </ul>	
	data to show what the increase in subsidies is that is coming into Vermont.	

	<ul> <li>The question was asked: How will the mapping be done to inform</li> <li>Vermenters what is bennening with their plan and why?</li> </ul>
	Vermonters what is happening with their plan and why? Communication will be simple and clear: more subsidies are available
	this year.
	Mike mentioned that the Green Mountain Care Board's actuarial
	analysis of this change showed a \$40 million increase in buying power
	for Vermonters towards health coverage. He noted that buying power is not affordability.
	Discussion ensued on affordability of insurance.
	<ul> <li>Zack reviewed the initial communications plan for these changes.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Key messages are that more subsidies are available for 2025 and</li> </ul>
	customers are encouraged to shop the marketplace, looking at higher levels of coverage.
	He reviewed the mediums that are used for communications, both
	general such as social media and targeted such as mailed notices
	and emails.
	<ul> <li>Zack reviewed the timeline, beginning with message alignment that</li> </ul>
	has already begun, through open enrollment which ends January 15.
	<ul> <li>Communications will be designed to inform Vermonters about the</li> </ul>
	changes and empower Vermonters to make informed decisions.

7.Medicaid Director Update Monica Ogelby, Medicaid Director	<ul> <li>Monica provided an updated on the waiver amendment request. AHS has heard from CMS that due to their staffing and capacity to review waivers, they will not review Vermont's request in 2024.</li> <li>Staff have been working with CMS and meeting with the national federation as well as coordinating with Medicaid Directors to determine next steps in moving forward. The requests made are straightforward with precedence in other states and the hope is that it can be pushed sooner.</li> <li>She noted that the justice re-entry waiver amendment request is being considered separately from the other request and is expected to receive a response July 1.</li> <li>She welcomed feedback from committee members if there are items they want covered in future updates.</li> </ul>
