VERMONT MEDICAID COVERED SERVICES

Vermont Medicaid-participating providers should visit the Vermont Medicaid Portal and consult the Fee Schedule to confirm services provided to eligible Vermont Medicaid members are covered by Vermont Medicaid and to review reimbursement information. <http://www.vtmedicaid.com/#/feeSchedule>

Vermont Medicaid has eliminated co-payments for hospital outpatient services and eliminated co-payments for medications used to treat the symptoms of COVID-19. These changes ensure that no co-payments apply to Medicaid-covered services for COVID-19 testing, diagnosis, and treatment.

VERMONT MEDICAID COVERAGE AND REIMBURSEMENT GUIDANCE FOR COVID-19 TESTING & SPECIMEN COLLECTION

COVID-19 testing and specimen collection in Vermont should be in accordance with the guidelines produced by the Vermont Department of Health.¹ Vermont Medicaid-enrolled **clinical diagnostic laboratories** may submit claims for medically appropriate COVID-19 testing when ordered by a physician using: U0001, U0002, U0003, U0004, or 87635. The appropriate code is dependent upon the type of laboratory and/or the lab test technique.

During the period of the federal public health emergency, Vermont Medicaid-enrolled **clinical diagnostic laboratories** may also submit claims for separate, medically appropriate specimen collection for COVID-19 testing when ordered by a physician and specimen collection is completed:

- by trained personnel of the laboratory for a Vermont Medicaid member from their home, including a nursing home, using G2023; or
- by trained personnel of the laboratory on behalf of a home health agency, using G2024.
- Please note: Specimen collection may not be billed to Vermont Medicaid if a Vermont Medicaid member collects their own specimen.

Vermont Medicaid-enrolled **hospital outpatient departments** may submit claims for medically appropriate specimen collection from a Vermont Medicaid member using C9803. Collected specimens must be sent to a laboratory for diagnostic testing.

For Vermont Medicaid-enrolled **providers eligible to submit claims for medically necessary evaluation and management services**, specimen collection is already included as part of an evaluation and management visit for assessment of a Vermont Medicaid member (e.g. E/M 99201-99205 or 99212-99215) and should **not** be billed separately. (Providers billing for other primary procedures for the same patient on the same day should not bill for specimen collection.) CMS released [guidance](#) indicating that providers may be reimbursed for assessment and specimen collection for COVID-19 testing using the level 1 evaluation and management code, 99211, for all patients when this is the only procedure being provided for the patient on that day. Collected specimens must be sent to a laboratory for diagnostic testing. Finally, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services has provided [information](#) for providers on reimbursement for [counseling](#) patients at the time of COVID-19 testing about the importance of self-isolation/quarantine after they are tested and prior to the onset of symptoms. The information indicates that physicians and other qualified health care providers should use existing codes as appropriate, including evaluation and management visit codes, when furnishing counseling services related to isolation/quarantine.

For **home health services**, when a Vermont Medicaid member is already receiving home health services and receives a Medicaid-covered home health visit, a specimen may be collected by the home health nurse during the visit when ordered under the written plan of care. The collected specimen must be sent to a laboratory for diagnostic testing. Specimen collection is not reimbursed separately because it is part of the covered visit.

Collected specimens must be sent to a laboratory for diagnostic testing. The Office of Professional Regulation and Board of Pharmacy published a [guidance document](#) that contains information about COVID-19 testing, including when a Clinical Laboratory Improvement Act (CLIA) Certificate of Waiver is required:

- A CLIA Certificate of Waiver is **not** required for a pharmacy to collect specimen samples for transmission to an outside laboratory.

Diagnosis Coding for COVID-19 Infections

Providers should visit <https://www.cdc.gov/nchs/icd/icd10cm.htm> for the most up-to-date coding guidelines for COVID-19. The CDC has released the [ICD-10-CM Official Guidelines for Coding and Reporting FY 2021](#) with updated information specific to coronavirus infections:

- U07.1, 2019-nCoV acute respiratory disease, should be assigned **only for confirmed diagnosis of the 2019 novel coronavirus disease**.
- Z20.828 should be assigned for exposure to COVID-19 for asymptomatic individuals with actual or suspected exposure to COVID-19.

- Z20.828 should be assigned for exposure to COVID-19 for symptomatic individuals with actual or suspected exposure to COVID-19 and the infection has been ruled out, or tests results are inconclusive or unknown.

Providers should add other diagnoses by sequencing additional appropriate codes for associated manifestations subsequent to the principal diagnosis when COVID-19 meets the definition of principal diagnosis except when another guideline requires that certain codes are sequenced first.

REMINDER TO PROVIDERS

Vermont Medicaid-enrolled providers are reminded that COVID-19 tests performed must be Food and Drug Administration-approved or granted Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) through the Food and Drug Administration for the public health emergency and in accordance with the guidance of the Vermont Department of Health. Providers who are already receiving reimbursement from another source for specimen collection or for COVID-19 testing should not bill Vermont Medicaid.
